UERIKUA DELIVERS LAST SORA OF HIS TERM AS OTJOZONDJUPA GOVERNOR

James Unomasa Uerikua took over the helm of Governor for Otjozondjupa Region in April 2020 after his appointment by the late President Dr Hage Gottfried Geingob. The State of the Region Address is provided for under Article 110A Sub-Articles (5) and (6) which states that " A Regional Governor shall attend a meeting of the Regional Council of the region for which he or she is the Regional Governor once every year, which meeting shall after the President and Cabinet attend Parliament in terms of Article 32 (2) thereof.

During the meeting referred to in Sub-Article (5), the Regional Governor shall address the Regional Council on the state of the region, planned activities of the Central Government of

the previous year in the region and be available to respond to questions. fifth State of the Region Address was aligned to Vision 2030, National Development Plans. and Harambee Prosperity Plan one and two. Delivering the SORA he said, the key focus of our region is to enhance goodthrough governance strict adherence to all principles of Good-Governance.

One key principle is to embody a participatory approach to ensure that every sector whether Government or private, is part of the synergic efforts of prompt, effective, meaningful yet sustainable service delivery. Similarly, he added that, Transparency and accountability are the two cornerstones of democratic

governance as their primary objective is to implement the decision of the people and provide appropriate feedback. OVER 20 00 HOUSEHOLDS RECEIVING DROUGHT RELIEF IN OTJOZONDJUPA

During his recent State of the Region Address, the Governor of Otjozondjupa Region delivered a significant update on the ongoing drought relief efforts in the region that are supporting rural and peri-urban communities.

James Uerikua revealed that 20960 rural and peri-urban households receive drought relief food, due to the severe drought conditions that affect continue to the livelihoods of many. Governor Uerikua said that communities in many Otjozondjupa Region, consists of large rural and communal areas, that rely heavily on subsistence farming for With the survival. ongoing drought, these communities are facing negative impacts on livina standards. their The office of the Prime Minister, through a Cabinet directive

resolved to implement a Drought Relief Programme. The programme was launched on 1st October 2023, funded through the National Emergency Disaster Fund.

Since April 2024, the drought relief programme has expanded to include vulnerable people living in peri-urban and informal settlements. "Previously, these communities often overlooked were in drought relief efforts due to the misconception that urban residents were generally better off than their rural counterparts. However, many people living in peri-urban areas are migrants from rural communities who moved to urban areas in search of better living conditions but ended up in poverty" said Uerikua. The governor however expressed concern that only 5,000 out of 10,300 eligible peri-urban

registered beneficiaries have received assistance thus far. Governor Uerikua commended the the prime minister's office for heeding the call to include peri-urban communities in the drought relief programme. He acknowledged that while rural areas have long been prioritized, the inclusion of informal settlements is a critical step in addressing widespread poverty in both urban and rural areas.

He urged everyone to continue supporting the government's efforts in mitigating the effects of drought, emphasizezing the importance of inclusivity in development and relief efforts. Households receive bags of maize meal, tins of canned fish, soy soup packets and bottles of cooking oil rations every month, providing much-needed relief to families struggling with the effects of the drought.

The Otjozondjupa Regional Council officially inaugurated its state of the art Office Park. The journey of this remarkable project began with the completion of the first phase in 2006 at an investment of twenty million Namibia dollars. The initial phase consists of a double-story administrative block, meticulously designed to meet our growing needs. The block comprises of eighteen offices, a boardroom, a Council Chamber and also hosts the office of our Governor and currently also the It comprises eighteen offices, a boardroom, and а Council Chamber Otjiwarongo Constituency office. This development is aligned to the aspirations of the **Decentralization Enabling Act 33** of 2000. The construction was funded through the Ministry of Urban and Rural Development in

two phases whereby Phase one was funded to the tune of 20 Million and Phase two with an additional funding of One Hundred Forty Three Million, Six Hundred and Ninety Thousand and Nine Hundred Twenty Two Namibian Dollars Sixty Five Cents.Officially inaugurating the Office Park was the Minister of Urban and Rural Development Erastus Uutoni who said that these facilities are not merely structures but are integral the to government's mission of providing excellent service to the people of Otjozondjupa. "They stand as a testament our commitment to to progress, development, and the well-being of our community.The Government of the Republic of Namibia is committed to bringing

development to all corners of country, thus our our gathering here today is a testament to clear that commitment. SPRO...How would you sum up your five years as Chief Regional Officer for Otjozondjupa Regional Council?

Mweti...The Five Years I spent with Council flew by quickly before I could comprehend and this goes to show how busy the office of the Chief Regional Officer is. There is never a time when there is no work-load and thus time is never enough to an extent that you have to work even when you are not in the office. I joined the Otjozondjupa Regional Council 1st of May 2019.

My Five years was spent on Governance-putting up governance structures and systems such as policies. support committees and an integrated regional development process. With the latter also focusing on Impactful development at regional level considering that development is bottom-up and a participatory process.

Mutorwa Illuminates the Disaster Risk Management Act 10 of 2012

The Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Works and Transport, Hon. John Mutorwa held a consultative meeting with the Otjozondjupa Governor Hon. James Uerikua and the Disaster Risk Management Committee members together with various stakeholders at Otjozondjupa Regional Council Chamber in Otjiwarongo. The purpose of the meeting is to consult about the drought relief programme and the challenges food faced during the distribution programme and elaborate more light on the Risk Disaster Management (DRM) Act 10 of 2012. Mutorwa calls for attention to the

Disaster Risk Management law and regulations implemented by the Office of the Prime Minister's Office Act 10 of 2012. Не explained and emphasised the DRM's responsibilities to improve their effectiveness and efficiency within the administration of the regional drought relief programme, the president declared a state of emergency on drought and therefore, all administrators and institutions should adjust their attitude

"When you look at their responses in terms of them aligning with the seriousness of the issue at hand, I think all

prescient institutions need to know and understand that we are adjusting from operating under these regulations and are now operating under these emergencies a state of emergency has been declared the governing institutions should act accordingly said Mutorwa".

In addition, challenges with the transportation of drought relief food to the constituencies should be treated seriously and solutions should be omnipresent. Lack of sufficient means serious disruption of the functioning of a community or society which will pose a significant, widespread threat to human life, and health which exceeds the ability of the affected community or society to cope using its resources therefore the procurement division should speed up the bidding producers and treat it as exemption to solve and deliver the food to the prospective consistencies.

GROOTFONTEIN PRISON TO BECOME FURNITURE FACTORY

The Grootfontein Correctional Facility's industrial workshop is set to become a major furniture manufacturing centre, supplying ministries government and agencies. This plan was by announced Deputy Commissioner-General of the Namibia Correctional Services (NSC), Sam Shaalulange, at a handover ceremony of the repaired furniture to Kalenga Primary English School in Grootfontein on Friday.

Shaalulange, who heads the Correctional Operations Department, stated that the Grootfontein Correctional Facility has been identified and strengthened to serve as a central carpentry and joinery workshop where quality furniture will be produced. "This centre will produce furniture for the Namibian Correctional Service, Government Offices, Ministries and Agencies, as well as other public and private organizations and individuals who need these services. It is for this reason that, in a few days, seven large carpentry and joinery

machines including a sawmill large to process logs to lumber, will be delivered to this facility. Additionally, several skilled correctional officers and inmates will be transferred Grootfontein the to Correctional Facility to enhance its capacity to manufacture on a large scale," he said.

Namibia The Correctional Services operates industrial workshops at seven of its facilities across the country, training inmates in various trades such as bricklaying and carpentry plastering, and joinery, welding and metal fabrication, upholstery, auto mechanics, panel beating, and spray painting. Shaalulange mentioned that these training programs are designed to equip inmates with skills and prepare them for reintegration into society upon release. Over 500 chairs and 30 desks from Kalenga English Primary

from Kalenga English Primary School were repaired by inmates at the Grootfontein Correctional Facility.

his acceptance speech, In behalf, read on his the Grootfontein Circuit Education Inspector Markus Munengu, praised the Namibia Correctional Services for repairing the school's broken furniture at no cost, adding that it significantly enhances the quality of teaching and learning at the school. This initiative aligns with the Ministry of Education, Arts and Culture's policy on National Standards and Performance Indicators.

"Key Area 7 of the policy addresses the provision of resources for the school and hostel. including physical resources such as classrooms, offices, chairs, and desks. The demand for these critical resources has surpassed the available resources allocated by government. It is important for stakeholders to participate and provide the necessary support to meet the needs of educating Namibian child and move our nation forward" he said.



Indigenous communities together with organizations and stakeholders knowledgeable in Indigenous affairs came under one roof in Otjiwarongo to attend the first ever workshop aimed at protecting Namibian Indigenous knowledge systems including languages.

The week-long summit aimed at promoting dialogue among the participants on how Indigenous culture and practices. languages can be saved and incorporated into national development agendas. It is also dedicated to showcasing the role of Indigenous communities in global scientific knowledge, particularly in agriculture, medicine and conservation.

According to some of the traditional leaders who participated in the workshop one of the most pressing concerns facing Namibian indigenous communities is the need to preserve their unique cultural heritage. Its culture is

encapsulated in languages, rites, and traditional practices that are increasingly under pressure from the processes of modernization, and globalization. Throughout the week, participants learned about approaches that can be used to record Indigenous expression and knowledge in a systematic way for the benefit of future generations. of А major theme the indigenous conversation: languages were disappearing. They had described the fact that, as languages disappear, so too the special kinds of knowledge they encoded. Others urged governments and faces of institutions to encourage programs for the revitalization of Indigenous languages, both in school and within work local at communities. The workshop highlighted also the between connection traditional indigenous knowledge and science to demonstrate

indigenous measures how practices can contribute to a broader scientific endeavour, sustainable like agriculture, climate adaptation, and as such indigenous knowledge can help transforming biodiversity in conservation.

Deputy Minister of Marginalised Royal /Ui/o/oo communities, who spoke at the workshop said that "Indigenous knowledge is not mere cultural heritage but science. Such a method is crucial achieving future to а of sustainability, particularly for issues such as climate resilience and natural resources" he said.

The overarching message of the week-long workshop was clear: Indigenous knowledge and essential languages are to building a sustainable future for all Namibians. By acknowledging the contributions of indigenous communities and protecting their rights. Namibia can ensure traditions that these rich continue to flourish and contribute to the country's development.

GOVERNMENT INSTITUTIONS PENSION FUND ENGAGES OTJIWARONGO COMMUNITY

The Government Institutions Pension Fund (GIPF) held a regional stakeholder forum engagement in collaboration with Allan Garv. Namibia Revenue Agency (NamRA), Bank of Namibia (BoN), Public Service Medical Aid Scheme (PSEMAS First Namibia Capital) and Financial Institutions Authority Supervisory (NAMFISA) in Otjiwarongo, Otjozondjupa region at Paresis Hall. The aim is to assist respite between GIPF its members and bv fund-related discussing issues that are of required concern and apply to matters such as admissions, housing, the GIPF rules, benefits and procedures, medical aid after retirement and related tax matters.

The engagement forum was officially inception by the Hon. Moreover, the forum collaboration aims to create further awareness ensurina communication that all civil servants may not only understand the pension fund broader financial but also systems, medical aid, and tax regulations affecting their benefits. The event, attended by key stakeholders in the education sector, marked a significant milestone in the country's efforts to embrace digital learning. The Digital School pilot program will provide students with online learning resources and enable them to participate in virtual classrooms, thus addressing challenges such as limited access to learning materials and qualified teachers, particularly in rural areas. Minister of Education, Arts, and Culture, Anna Nghipondoka, who presided over the launch, expressed her excitement

about the initiative and its to transform potential education in Namibia. "Our hearts are filled with gratitude we embark this as on transformative journey. This project, which also extends its benefits to our neighbouring nations of Angola, Zambia, Madagascar, Lesotho, and South Africa, represents a beacon of hope and progress in shared our pursuit of educational excellence. Our goal is to bridge the education and create a more gap equitable learning environment for all" she said.

The launch of The Digital School Nghipondoka said, is a forward giant leap for Namibia's education sector. This platform will ensure that behind, no child left is of regardless their geographical location. It is part of a broader national effort to enhance educational utilizing outcomes by technology to overcome challenges such as

limited access to learning resources, remote learning needs. and ensuring that Namibia's youth are prepared for digital а future. Nghipondoka also commended the teachers who had undergone rigorous training to effectively use digital tools and facilitate virtual learning. acknowledging their role in driving the future of education in Namibia. A total of 60 teachers successfully completed training programs in digital education and are now equipped to integrate technology into their teaching methods, providing students with interactive and innovative learning experiences.

Sixteen schools will benefit from the project, with one school per region designated as the digital pilot school, however Khomas and Hardap Regions will each have two schools during the pilot phase of the project.

EDUCATION DEPUTY MINISTER ENGAGES OTJOZONDJUPA STAKEHOLDERS

The Deputy Minister of Education, Arts and Culture Hon. Faustina Caley together with Governor James Uerikua, held a regional engagement meeting with Principals and Heads of Departments (HODs) in Otjiwarongo Otjozondjupa Region at the Regional Council's Conference Hall to discussed improvement of the regional educational performances. The engagement according to Calev is held under the declaration of the African Union (AU) theme "Educate an African fit for the 21st Century: Building resilient education systems for increased access to inclusive, lifelong, quality, and relevant learning in Africa". Education Regional Director Gerhard Ndafenongo presented the regional statistics on the achievements of various regional schools, he stated that last year's national grade 11 and AS level

examinations ranking in Otjozondjupa is at the 7th position nationally compared to 2022 which was ranked 5th countrywide. According to Ndafenongo only five hundred and sixty-nine (569) learners qualified for the National Senior Secondary Certificate Subsidiary Level this year, translating to 5.5% alluded and that the affects foundation the region's education, as only half of the first graders had pre-primary access to education. The region faces challenges that impede the optimum results of strong systems, а shortage of qualified teachers, especially in Indigenous languages, and a lack of new teaching and technologies. learning Furthermore, improving school performance requires joint effort and cooperation between learners, teachers



and parents, by applying effective strategies to improve school performance an ideal learning environment be achieved can that contributes to learners' academic success and the development of their skills and abilities.

The games which are held annually are on a rotational basis through a hosting draw, where the first games were hosted in 2016 by the Khomas Regional Council at the Independence Stadium in Windhoek. The second edition of the games were hosted by the Zambezi Regional Council 2017 with Omaheke in Regional Council hosting the edition, 2018 while **Ohangwena Regional Council** the 2019 edition hosted respectively.


