Otjozondjupa liberation struggle veterans remembers Geingob

Liberation struggle stalwarts in Otjozondjupa region have joined the rest of the country in paying tribute to the late President Hage Geingob. Geingob who they hailed a unifier died on the 4th of February at a Windhoek hospital at the age of 82.

81-year-old former Robben Island prisoner Lazarus Guiteb remembered Geingob's youthful days when he was a member of the Goldstar Brothers Band that used to travel from Okahadia and come perform at concerts and play soccer in Otjiwarongo during the days when he Augustineum was at College **Teachers** Okahandja.



"Geingob was a cheerful young man whom I first met in 1960s, I met him in Otjiwarongo when he was a member of the Goldstar Brothers Band that used to travel from Okahandja. He slept at our house.

The octogenarian Guiteb further told that while in exile, he saw Geingob grow into several senior political positions of Swapo.He said the late President was a unifier and a true

They used to come and perform in Otjiwarongo during the days when he was at Augustineum Teachers College.

n 1977, I was arrested and sentenced to eight years in Robben prison to Island, where I was kept until 1985. In 1986 in Luanda, Angola, I met Geingob again in the liberation struggle meetings, discovered - 1 Geingob had become a big senior Swapo leader and a Guiteb people's person" recalled.

They said the late statesman, who was their director in exile at the United Nations Institute of Namibia (UNIN) in Lusaka, Zambia, his tutelage at the institute positively changed lives.

"He was my school principal at UNIN who I met twice in 1983 and 1986 as I was a well-known star performer," said former Okahadja Chief Executive Officer, Martha Mutilifa.

Another UNIN graduate, Peter Kavaongelwa a UNIN graduate and a former PLAN fighter and a war veteran and who would later become a magistrate in an independent Namibia, said UNIN under Geingob played a major role in his life.

"In 1980 when I joined the liberation struggle, we were welcomed at Lusaka International Airport that year by Geingob, who was with the late Hidipo Hamutenya and the late Mose Tjitendero. He was our father at UNIN who also respected his senior political leaders," said Kavaongelwa.

Grootfontein Mayor, Talitha Garises who met Geingob through her late husband Engelhardt Adolf Gariseb, said Geingob was a family friend to them. Whom despite his busy political schedule made time to call on them.

"Geingob was a friend to my late husband as both of them attended Augustineum Secondary School, played football together and even taught at one school Tsumeb before he left for exile. Their friendship continued upon his return to Namibia in 1989, until Gariseb passed away on 24 December 2002, she stated.

The next day Geingob was at our house in Grootfontein mourning with us until the burial of my late husband. May his soul rest in peace," remorsed Garises.

War veteran and district coordinator of Former PLAN Combatants Association in the Okakarara area, Retired Colonel Wa-Kahimise Rahamisa said he crossed path with Geingob during the Tanganyika days when used to work personal assistant in the office of Peter late Nanyemba in Tanzania.

"I mostly used to fax Swapo documents to the United States of America where Geingob was, in this way, I came to know about him," said Rahamisa.

After independence Wa-Kshimise remembers Geingob as a brilliant dancer with whom he always

competed at various rallies of the Swapo Party.

Deputy former PLAN Combatants Association in Okakarara district, Aletta Mbirimujo on her part urged the Namibian people to embrace Geingob's legacy as well as to see to it that his wishes are fulfilled as way to celebrate his life.

"The pensioners' cake was increased during his term from where it was to the N\$1400. current pensioners in the country are enjoying the same old age pension regardless of their political affiliation. We for give thanks administration and all they have achieved, we wish his successor to continue with Geingob's good work," said a thankful Mbirimujo.

Mbakera also announced a 30 percent rebate for special customers, urging staff to raise awareness within communities to ensure eligible individuals benefit from this initiative. "To assist



NATIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION CONSULTS OTJOZONDJUPA

Stakeholders in the Otjozondjupa Region engaged on the conclusion of the National Development Plan - (NDP 5) and the formulation of NDP 6 at Otjiwarongo. The meeting highlighted challenges encountered in the implementation of NDP 5 and possible inclusions in NDP 6.

The engagement marked the last of Regional Consultation by the National Planning Commission - (NPC) with the exception of the Khomas region. Following the launch, NPC set conducted regional consultations across the 14 regions and 121 constituencies, with the aim





of fostering optimal public participation in development process of NDP6. NDP6 The development process was done in two financial years, 2023/2024 from to 2024/2025, to ensure comprehensive citizen involvement. The public was encouraged strongly attend these consultations, to gain insights into the NDP6 formulation process and its implications on their lives. This engagement served as a valuable source of local context information, shaping priorities, objectives, and mitigation measures in the final NDP6 document. The regional and constituencies consultations where done with representatives of Regional Councils (Governors, Constituencies Councillors), O/M/As regional representatives, Traditional Authorities, Councils, Town Village Councils, **Business** representative, Educational Inspectors, Academia, Youth, Children, Civil Society, NGOs, Church leaders, Inhabitants specific Constituency/ Region, media, and the public at large.

The main purpose of these extensive consultations was to facilitate a two-way dialogue between NPC and stakeholders in shaping the development agenda for the concluding stage of Vision 2030. The key objectives included assessing the performance

of NDP5 and Vision 2030, garnering widespread stakeholder support for the NDP6, documenting region-specific challenges and opportunities across the country's 14 regions, and providing a platform for diverse stakeholder engagement. The NDP6 formulation process was initiated by a launch on June 26, 2023, in Windhoek, aiming to raise awareness among stakeholders and the public at large. During consultations in with stakeholders in Otjozondjupa, registered the following challenges during the implementation of NDP5.







The Otjiwarongo Municipality presented its "Smart City" Strategic Plan to the Otjozondjupa Regional Council, outlining a visionary roadmap for sustainable development and modernization.

The presentation to the regional council was to afford the regional leadership to peruse and make inputs to the plan before it is officially launched. The plan spanning from 2024-2029, is geared towards transforming Otjiwarongo into a smart, sustainable, and inclusive city.

The strategic plan is built on

five key objectives, including creating a sustainable working environment and enhancing public safety, promoting the socio-economic advancement of the town, fostering business innovation and ensuring financial sustainability, as well as improving the operational efficiency of the workforce. Addressing the council, the town's Acting Chief Executive Ofiicer Erickson Mwaanyekange, highlighted the urgent need to address

"Our town is battling with old, dilapidated and infrastructure as a result we are currently losing over 700,000 litres of monthly due to aging through leakages. To combat this, we embarked comprehensive infrastructure assessment and upgrade program" stressed Mwaanyekange.

In response to the presentation, the Chairperson of the Otjozondjupa Regional Council and Otjiwarongo Constituency Councilor,

a terrible state lets attend to them and make sure we have quality roads. As you know Otjiwarongo is a big town and its centrally located, but we institutions of high learning, meaning our students must travel to other regions to access tertiary education. The Smart City Strategic Plan represents a bold step towards positioning Otjiwarongo as a model smart city, embracing innovation, sustainability, and inclusivity.

Marlayn Mbakera commended the municipality for its forward-thinking approach and urged them to prioritize the state of the town's roads. "I want to thank the municipality for a brilliant strategic plan. However, I want municipality to pay attention to our town roads, they are in

to enhance connectivity and access to information, the strategic plan includes smart partnerships with internet service providers to provide free internet to residents. This initiative aims to bridge the digital divide and empower residents with access to information and resources.





The plan also recognizes the challenges faced by the over 22,000 residents living in informal settlements, most of whom are not ratepayers due unemployment and lack of ratable services in the area. The municipality is committed to improving their living and conditions ensuring they included in the town's development agenda. To increase its revenue base,

the municipality plans to create a business arm to run non-essential services, such as the biomass factory. This Mwaanyekange says aims to mitigate the financial impact of challenges such as drought and the COVID-19 pandemic. He further informed the council that the municipality will strengthen its debt recovery, to recover outstanding debts amounting to 57 million Namibian dollars by the town's customers.

Otjozondjupa Regional Council spend an amount of six hundred and ninety one thousand four hundred and twenty four Namibia dollars on projects in the region under various Rural Development programmes for the 2023/2024 financial vear. These projects are all aimed at uplifting the living standard of the rural residents of the region.

Micro Under the Finance programme which is aimed at promoting Small and Medium Enterprises productivity order to be able to compete with other producers in the market, Council supported nine projects in the region.

Under the Food and Cash for Work programme which is aimed at creating short-term employment opportunities for the poor and also seeks to create and maintain fixed assets which the community

can use to further their socioeconomic development, Council supported the Aunns Gardening project Grootfontein Constituency with gardening equipment to the value of sixty six thousand eight hundred and seven eiaht.

Similar under the Support to Poor Rural Framers which aims to support the activities marginalized communal farmers either technically, materially or financially in order to ensure economic sustainability in the rural areas Namibia, of Council supported beneficiaries in the Omatako Constituency with 20 goats each consisting of nineteen ewes and one ram to the value of one hundred and four thousand thirty five hundred Namibia dollars.

In terms of land delivery Council is struggling with a high demand for land in settlement areas such as Kalkfeld in the Otjiwarongo both and business purposes. However, for this financial vear Council has made provision for about 239 plots at the settlement which have been planned and about 190 informal applications for land have been received from Kalkfeld residents which also been have demarcated to this effect.

applicants These have already been issued with allocation letters and most of the have also signed lease agreements as land in the settlements can only offered on a lease-hold basis. In terms of business Council has ervens. allocated about 11 business ervens to different business people who are interested in investing at in the settlement. This range from Feedlot, butchery, private school, culinary school, fuel stations etc.

The Otjozondjupa Regional Council has also entered into a Memorandum of Understanding with the National Housing Enterprise (NHE) for affordable housing Kalkfeld delivery at Settlement.

Water is Life: Water reticulation works in Kalkfeld

Council is also entrusted with the provision of services for land such as water and sewer reticulation in the settlement as it is mandated to administer this settlement areas like municipal areas.

Council is thus currently bid for running construction of water reticulation at Kalkfeld for the Dinosadal Residential area at which Council has allocated 61 plots in 2022 for formal residential plots. The other area to be serviced with water in the informal area where 239 plots have been allocated to residents already.

Although the area is being called informal, it is just to make provision for those residents who are unable to construct brick houses at eh area at the moment however, in the planning of this residential area, Council is trying by all means to ensure the area is ready to be formalized when funds permit and by providing water reticulation it is also just to allow residents who are able to afford the opportunity to connect to such services.

Sanitation still remains challenge for the region as there are still parts where open defecation is practiced. However in order to address this challenge Council through its Rural Development programmes continues to make considerable strides In its efforts to address open defecation in the region through construction of rural ventilated Pit latrine toilet (VIP toilets).

During the last financial year council constructed seven VIP toilets at Rudenau in the Okahandja Constituency to the value of one hundred and twenty three thousand, nine hundred and seventeen Namibia dollars. Furthermore, Council is in the process of constructing two hundred and twenty five VIP toilets. One hundred and sixteen of these will be constructed in the Okakarara constituency while another one hundred

and nine will be constructed Tsumkwe in the Constituency. The process constructing toilets starts off with a triggering process which is aimed at changing the mind sets of the communities and encouraging them to away with open defecation through the use toilet facilities. The triggering is done through Community Led Total Sanitation - CLTS and the Water and Sanitation Hygiene **WASH** approaches.

A total of eight villages have been triggered so far, three in Okakarara and five in the Tsumkwe Constituency respectively.

The CLTS is community-based sanitation approach, which is introduced to Namibia by UNICEF and fully supported by the Ministry of Health and Social Services (MoHSS) and the Ministry of Agriculture, Water and Land Reform (MAWLR).

The Community-Led Total Sanitation (CLTS) approach facilitates communities to conduct their own appraisal and analysis of open defecation, mobilizing people to identify and find solutions to their sanitation and hygiene needs.

It involves facilitating a process to inspire and empower rural communities to stop open defecation and to build and use pit latrine toilets.

2022 to April 2023, a total of one hundred and seventyeight (178) stock theft case were reported, of which twenty-five (25) belonged toCoblenz residence, eight two (82) from Okakarara seventeen (17), Okamatapati thirty-two (32) and Otjituuo recorded a total number of twenty-two cases and statistics released early from April 2023 to January 2024 showed in an effiencent increase stock theft which recorded ninetyfour (94) from Okakarara that is having a high rate of stock theft followed Okondjatu with sixteen (16) cases, Otjituuo fifteen (15), Okamatapati eleven (11) and Coblenz recorded the lowest stock theft cases with only six (6).

That includes our girl child . Our girl child is in a serious threat from people who are trying to thrive on them through exploitive means, advancing their own agendas of hate and violence against the girl child," He said.

Uerikua stressed that as much society keeps advocating for the rights of women, the rights of the girl and boy child must also be on the agenda.

"If we are advocating for women rights, the girl child's right must also be on the agenda. But as much as we are talking about the girl child agenda, let us also not forget about the boy child," said the Uerikua told the people in Governor noting that the boy as most the country's prisons are full of men.

> "Those that you say criminals, house breaking and are men. So there is a need that while we are focusing on women rights advancement, lets also stop over consider the boy child. Let us not neglect the boy child,"said Uerikua.

> In addition, the Governor also noted that as much as the boy child should not be neglected, women and girls remains Government's allies in development.

Governor further The encouraged the youth, mostly girls, to be obedient to their parents and mind what they are doing in front of the young ones that are still in school since they are easy to copy what their elder sisters are doing.

"We need to look into that from a societal point that we need to go back to our



cultures and traditions of knowing what is wrong and what is not wrong,"he said.

Meanwhile, Deputy Minister for Disability Affairs in the Ministry of Gender Equality, Poverty and Social Welfare, in the Office of the President, Alexia Manombe-Ncube, at the same occasion spoke about the need to invest in women, girls and the boy child.

"We need to invest in women and girls including the boy child for us as a nation to be able to accelerate progress in various areas of our society. Let us employ and implement the Gender Responsive Planning and Budgeting initiative in our institutional policies, programmes strategies," said the deputy minister.

Manombe-Ncube emphasised that gender budgeting promotes better utilisation of country's financial resources by matching budgets to plans, priority programmes and projects while ensuring that the needs of women and men, girls and boys are given due attention.

Acting education director of the Otjozondjupa region Urivangera Tjivikua said the national examination results of both advance subsidiary level and ordinary level of the has region dropped compared year's to last performance.

Tjivikua, said the region's performance has been on the trajectory downward in recent years. "The region regressed a bit for the last three years. We have been at number five in terms of the national rankings. However, last year, we were ranked number six in the National Senior Secondary Certificate Advanced Subsidiary level and number seventh in the National Senior Secondary Certificate Ordinary level and number eighth in terms of the number of candidates who qualified to the Advanced Subsidiary level.

That signals a bit of backward movement, but I think we did not regress too far behind, we can still catch around to position number five or even better than that" emphasized Tjivikua.

Despite the region's poor performance, the acting director commended the Otjiwarongo Senior secondary school which ranked in the ninth position nationally in the ordinary level. He also showered praise to Grootfontein senior secondary school for its performance that earned it a third place in the Advance Subsidiary level nationally.

"Otjiwarongo senior secondary school was ninth the national senior secondary certificate ordinary level. And at least we can tell that is the best performing school in the region at that level. Grootfontein secondary was number three in advanced subsidiary level nationally. Those are the only two schools that we have identified as having performed very well.

"I can attest to some schools that have gone an extra mile in their preparation for the examination last year.

Some home weekends they will keep learners and teachers behind to assist the learners. It is because of these extra miles that the teachers have gone that we got where we are. I want to encourage all the teachers, at our schools in the region this year to redouble their efforts" said Tjivikua.

The Otjozondjupa region is ranked in the seventh position nationally compared to last year's performance in which it ranked the fifth performing region in the country. Early last year the education directorate in the region introduced Capacity Development **Programs** response to teacher's needs and aimed to improving the results of leaners in the region.

This year, only 569 learners have qualified for the National Senior Secondary Certificate Advanced Subsidiary Level in the region, signifying a 5.5 percentage.

The Regional Councilor for Otjiwarongo Constituency and Chairperson of Otjozondjupa Regional Council Marlayn Mbakera donated stationeries to about forty needy leaners from various school at Otiiwarongo. The Councilors office wrote letters to identify the leaners November last vear following an overflow requests from parents to her office.

The learners identified by the schools were then screened through house visits by the Councilors office in order to really ascertain their circumstances. They range from grades zero to ten. The stationeries which consisted books, pens, pencils, colouring pencils, rulers and book covers were valued at about ten thousand Namibia dollars. The leaners where also treated with sweets and juice for their lunch boxes.

Mbakera said most of the learners who received the stationeries are performing poorly due to various circumstances. For some of

the learners the situation at home is not conducive as they live in poverty and some live in the informal settlements on the outskirts of town and are thus forced to walk long distances to and from school a situation that leads some to arrive at school, a few hours after teaching and learning is already taking place.

However, the Otjiwarongo Constituency Councilor Marlayn Mbakera called on the learners not to give up hope as there is light at the end of the tunnel calling on them to also be disciplined discipline and performance go along. The Councillors also informed learners that her office has arranged for someone to be assisting learners homework and projects especially for high school learners in order to help improve performance.

She said though this is a yearly activity under her office, Council does not have a budget for it and called on good Samaritans and the business community assist in providing various school supplies to needy learners. This she said will go a long way in ensuring that are learners attending school with good mindsets and thereby improve on their learning and performance. Mbakera further encouraged parents to look after their children and keep them off the streets.





Chicken project sustain community

In addition, the project indicated an exceptional impact on the lives of children and families within the outskirts, and one of the challenges the group is facing is the high cost of chicken feed and how fast the chickens consumed the feedings which affect the production and the profit of the project as one has to travel far to buy the chicken feeding.
